TEXAS INSTITUTE OF LETTERS ANNOUNCES WINNERS OF 2021 LITERARY AWARDS

The Texas Institute of Letters has announced the winners of the thirteen Annual TIL Literary Awards. In a year with a record number of contest entries, the TIL will award more than \$25,000 in prizes to these writers at the virtual TIL Awards Ceremony and Presentation on April 17, 2021.

The Texas Institute of Letters is a nonprofit Honor Society founded in 1936 to celebrate Texas literature and recognize distinctive literary achievement. The TIL's elected membership consists of the state's most respected writers– including winners of the Pulitzer Prize, National Book Award, PEN/Faulkner Award, Man Booker Prize, Academy Award, International Latino Book Award, Americas Award, Lambda Literary Award, MacArthur Fellowship, and Guggenheim Fellowship.

The winners of the 2021 TIL Literary Awards are Bryan Washington, Marisol Cortez, Joe Holley, Chera Hammons, David Meischen, Miguel Angel González-Quiroga, co-winners Darcie Little Badger and Francisco Stork, Christina Soontornvat, Jarrett Pumphrey and Jerome Pumphrey, Mary Ann Jacob, and ire'ne lara silva. The titles of the winning works (all published in 2020) and awards are listed below. On April 17<sup>th</sup>, Benjamin Alire Sáenz will also receive the Texas Institute of Letters' prestigious Lon Tinkle Award for Lifetime Achievement, the highest honor given by the TIL.

President Sergio Troncoso: "I am thrilled we had such a successful awards season, and I want to thank the judges for their work in selecting such a diverse group of writers as winners. All of these writers richly deserve many accolades for the high quality of their works. The TIL remains at the forefront of identifying excellent literature by writers dedicated to their craft."

In addition, the TIL will be celebrating its fourteen newly inducted Members for 2021: fiction and nonfiction writers Cristina Rivera Garza, George Saunders, Bryan Washington, David Samuel Levinson, and Preston Lewis; award-winning poets Allison Hedge Coke, Kevin Prufer, and Scott Wiggerman; children's and YA authors Crystal Allen and Chris Barton; journalist Gail Caldwell; literary activist Tony Diaz; award-winning songwriter Michael Martin Murphey; and historian Raymond Caballero. A series of virtual readings in March and early April will feature new Members, and the April 17<sup>th</sup> virtual Ceremony and Presentation will include live readings and special videos by new Members.





#### Lon Tinkle Award for Lifetime Achievement

Winner of the PEN/Faulkner Award for Fiction for *Everything Begins* and Ends at the Kentucky Club and the Michael L. Printz Award and Lambda Literary Award for Aristotle and Dante Discover the Secrets of the Universe, Benjamin Alire Sáenz has been a prolific author with over twenty-five books published. His books include The Inexplicable Logic of My Life, Sammy and Juliana in Hollywood, Last Night I Sang to the Monster, In Perfect Light, Carry Me Like Water, The Book of What Remains, Dreaming the End of War, The Last Cigarette on Earth, A Gift from Papa Diego, and The Dog Who Loved Tortillas. For his work, Sáenz has also won the American Book Award, Patterson Book Prize, Stonewall Book Award, Pura Belpré Award, Tomás Rivera Mexican American Children's Book Award, Southwest Book Award, and two TIL awards dedicated to children's literature.
